A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Earlier this week we celebrated the feast day of St. Monica.

St. Monica is the mother of St. Augustine.

St. Augustine, as you may already know, was one of the most influential theologians of the entire history of the Catholic Church. His impact almost cannot be overstated.

And yet Augustine was not always on the right path. In fact, if you have read his book "the Confessions," in which he recounts his conversion to the Catholic religion, you will see he came from a life of debauchery.

So how did he get there? How did he have such a giant conversion from being an immoral pagan to a holy saint? He did so in no small part due to the prayers and tears that his mother, St. Monica, offered to God each and every day.

Monica is a Saint because she shows us the power of offering prayers and tears for the conversion of a loved one.

Know anyone who needs conversion? Love anyone who could benefit from having their lives turned around by God?

I am so often saddened to hear from parents and grandparents that their own kids or grandkids don't go to Church and don't practice the faith. Very often, the parents and godparents did everything 'right.' They sent their kids to Catholic school, made sure they went to Church, volunteered at Church, etc, and yet they still have kids who have fallen away. It is very sad and very common.

To them I would say look to the example of St. Monica. Your job as a parent and grandparent is the exact same, whether your kids are 5 months, 5 years old, or 50 years old. Your job is to get them to Heaven.

Feel free to nag them. Tell them they need to have their children baptized. Tell them they need to go to Church and to take their children to Church. Tell them if they don't they are doing spiritual harm to their children.

And pray, pray, pray for them. If you are older and wonder what you are still doing here, or wonder why you suffer so much with pains and sickness in your old age, well I tell you that you can offer that up to God as prayer. Offer it like St. Monica did.

God is faithful. If he can turn around Augustine and make him St. Augustine, he can do it for your kid or grandkid. There is always hope.

TELL VIRGINIA STATE LEGISLATORS THAT <u>ASSISTED SUICIDE IS WRONG!</u> Virginia legislators have requested a study about whether physician-assisted suicide should be legal in Virginia, after which policy recommendations will be made. A public comment period has begun, and they need to hear from you now! Life is a gift from God, not something to be discarded. Assisted suicide – among other things – would:

- Put many people at risk, especially the disabled and those suffering from depression
- Provide insurers with a financial incentive to cover assisted suicide rather than more expensive treatment
- Break our trust in doctors, who should strive to heal & alleviate pain, not kill their patients
